IMPORTANT NEWS

New Strategic Plan 2024-27

Our new Strategic Plan will be formally launched at the end of March. It is the result of considerable work over the last few months and builds on the experience of the Project over the last three years. The new plan is informed by our new vision and mission statements. It includes a new focus on stepping up with regarding to the environment. It also includes a renewed commitment to working in partnership with other organisations where possible, further developing SHEP as a community of practice, and taking a stronger stance regarding systemic exclusion, inequity and injustice.

Additional HSE Funding

We are very grateful to the HSE (Cork & Kerry) for its support to SHEP over many decades. This year, additional funding has been provided once again for SHEP's Advocacy Programme and for LIB Multicultural Counselling and Outreach Programme.

Project work going very well – across all Programmes

We are delighted that there has been very strong interest in our training programmes again this spring. Our Facilitation Training Programme and our Continuing Personal Development Training Programmes, for example, were both over-subscribed. The Community Education Programme continues to meet strong demand across Cork, Kerry, Limerick and Clare. The Counselling Programme is responding to the increasing demand for our low-cost counselling. The Advocacy Programme is able to reach additional older people and people with disabilities because of the additional funding the HSE has provided.

PUTTING SUSTAINABLITY AT THE CENTRE

Significant Progress being made

As you will be aware, SHEP has been placing urgency on working out how to engage effectively with the climate and biodiversity-loss emergencies. One expression of this is that our new strategic plan places sustainability at the core of all our work. This commitment is demonstrated in our joining the Green Spaces for Health Project last year. The collaborators include Cork City Council, the HSE, Cork Healthy Cities, CEF, and The Lantern Project. We are pleased to host and administer this project which coordinated by Maria Young. Separately, our links with the Ardfoyle Horticulture Project continue to develop. We are delighted also to be a proud partner in the Dome Collaboration (see below). Finally, we are still awaiting news from our application to Cork City Council for the new Climate Action Funding.

WHAT WE ARE EXCITED ABOUT

International Learning Partnership - NEPAL Visit to SHEP

We are really looking forward to the International Partnership Learning Visit to SHEP which will take place in April. A number of the staff of Sahakarmi Samaj, including Executive Director Ammar Air, will visit us for a ten-day programme of learning, reflection, exchange and joint-planning. We are particularly pleased the Mayor of Gaumul Rural Municipality and the Mayor of Jagannath Rural Municipality will also be part of the visiting group - these two mountainous and very remote areas in South West Nepal are key target areas in the current three year Irish-Aid funded programme. SHEP has been partnering Sahakarmi for 17 years and for almost all of this time Irish Aid has been a cofunder of this important work. Other partners that have supported us include ICCO Kerk in Actie and Development Fund Norway.



Erasmus Learner Exchange

For the first time ever SHEP will carry out a Learner Exchange through the support of the Erasmus programme. A group of twelve participants from SHEP will travel to our partner in Slovenia for a six-day programme of intercultural learning and exchange. The exchange will a strong focus on exploring environmental sustainability. We have been partnering with LUR for six years now and we are privileged to deepen our connection with them. We will host a group of adult learners from LUR Slovenia to SHEP in June. Up to now, SHEP's involvement in Erasmus has been about supporting the professional development of our staff and facilitators. The Commission is particularly interested in

including more adult learners from the non-formal sectors in the Erasmus Programme and we are happy to be involved in this important development.

COLLABORATIONS – other examples



Jim Sheehan and Tatenda Zira from SHEP participated in the OLA Chapter in February, along with other Projects partnering locally with the OLA Sisters including Cork Migrants Centre, and the Ardfoyle Horticulture Project.

Cork Education and Training Board

We continue to work closely with Cork Education and Training Board to deliver our community education programme in Cork City and County. We are working together with them at present to design a pilot which will include supporting participants to self-register on the 'FETCH' system. We are also working with them to develop a new 'REACH' project for the Autumn. This is likely to have a strong environmental focus.

Kerry Education and Training Board

We have been working with the Kerry Education and Training board of over twenty years – their support each year allows the SHEP Programme to reach communities across Kerry. They will shortly host a celebratory event to mark the SHEP 50th and to acknowledge the many local partnerships that have supported the work.

This year, the 10th Gathering of Cork City Community Education Providers is being organised by the Community Education Engagement Group. The group is a network 10-14 of Cork City Based Community Education Providers who have been working over recent years to develop and build a strong and independent voice for the 110 or so Community Education provider organisations in Cork City. SHEP has been a member of this collaboration since its inception five years ago, organising two event each year over that time.

The Gatherings serve as a connecting space, networking and information sharing opportunity. The most recent event in October 2023 was in Nano Nagle Place. That Gathering, and the profile of the speakers and the unique location, aimed to explore the connections between Environment and Community through the theme 'Nature Nurtures Community Education'. For this Gathering the aim is to explore the ways in which Community Education can offer a relational education experience for personal growth and for addressing personal and community experiences of exclusion, intolerance and prejudice. SHEP PRACTITIONER DEVELOPMENT

Healthy Ireland Waterford

For the first time, Healthy Ireland have partnered with us to offer a SHEP Reflective Practice Programme in Waterford.

Healthy Ireland Kilkenny

We are pleased that Healthy Ireland Kilkenny is collaborating with us to deliver an innovative 'Facilitating Groupwork for Health and Well-being' Programme for frontline workers in the Kilkenny Area.

South-East SPHE Community of Practice

This group of practitioners from a wide range of sectors meets for four days of training each year. This includes an annual residential training which takes place in Teach Brid, Tullow, Co. Carlow.



Slovak Teachers' Research Project & University of Exeter

With the support of the Erasmus Programme and in association with University of Exeter we have started phase two of this innovative collaboration. The focus of the work is on supporting the teachers to explore how the SHEP Experiential Learning Approach could be used to support mental health and well-being in schools in Slovakia. The group has worked mostly online – meeting approximately monthly. A Learning Visit to Ireland took place last Autumn and a two-day training was delivered by SHEP in Bratislava. Both of these pieces supported the teachers to deepen their understanding of the SHEP experiential approach.
